Project update

Spring Project Update



Firstly, we'd like to welcome our new residents to Wellesley. We hope you are settling into your homes and getting to know your neighbours. We are nearly halfway through the build with over 1,729 homes occupied. We estimate that it will take at least another 8 years until Wellesley is finally complete.

We are pleased to announce the works to Alisons Road Phase 3 are now complete. We are looking forward to the landscaped verges starting to grow, which will allow the area to fully take shape over the summer.

We are aiming to start works this summer on Hospital Road, Fire Station Road and Hope Grants Road in order to finish the roads and footpaths. This will no doubt cause disruption to residents living on these roads and the wider area however, we will work to limit the disruption as best we can.

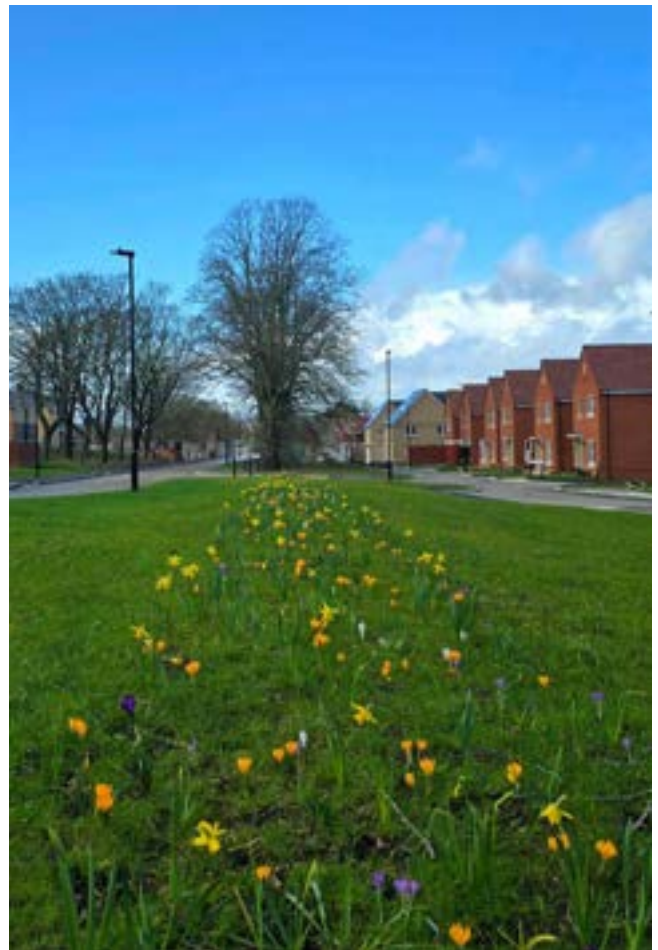
Once the works to the initial three roads is complete, we will be proceeding with starting works on Montgomery Avenue, West Hope Grants Road and Pennefather's Road. It is likely this second batch of roads will start in Autumn 2026 and won't be complete until Spring 2027.

The Neighbourhood Centre is one of the key aspects of the development that we are working on bringing forward. We have experience delays in the legal negotiations and these discussions are ongoing. We are unable to give a definitive timeframe at this point however we are committed to finding a developer who is best suited to delivering what is needed and to the high standards we expect. We are working toward being able to provide a timeframe along with a list of what will be provided in our summer newsletter.

Parking across the Wellesley Development is something for the most part, does not cause an issue. We have however received concerns

from residents reporting vehicles parking inappropriately. Please can we ask that all residents are vigilant and park appropriately to ensure everyone can enjoy living at Wellesley. We have been monitoring the streetlights across the development and we're glad to say we have almost repaired all streetlights that were faulty or not working. As not all streetlights on the Wellesley Development are our responsibility it can get confusing but rest assured, we are here to help. If you notice any streetlights that are not working, you can always contact us and we will decipher who's responsible for getting it repaired.

We have prepared the planning information for refurbishment of Maida Community Centre / Gym and we are in the process of drafting the business plan. The planning application submission has been delayed however for good reason. We are anticipating the business plan to be complete in the coming months which will then allow us to submit the design proposal for planning.



We currently have three developers working on the Wellesley Development, Bellway Homes, Weston Homes and Miller Homes. All three developers are progressing well and we look forward to when their areas are complete. Weston Homes have opened their show apartment at 'The Headquarters', it's most certainly worth a visit.

It was raised to us that the play park would benefit from having more seating. After reviewing the request, we are pleased to announce we will be installing more benches under the trees in the coming months.

Wellesley Heritage

4th Division Headquarters

In March 1894, Aldershot welcomed a distinguished royal visitor when Prince Arthur, Duke of Connaught and Strathearn, arrived to lay the foundation stone of the new military headquarters for Aldershot Command. The building designed by architect Thomas Jerome in the Victorian style and constructed by Martin Wells & Co was completed the following year (1895), marking a significant milestone in the development of the Garrison.

Prince Arthur was uniquely suited to preside over such an event. Born in 1850 as the seventh child of Queen Victoria and Prince Albert, he pursued a lifelong military career after entering the Royal Military Academy at Woolwich at the age of 16. He went on to serve across the British Empire for nearly four decades, eventually rising to the rank of Field Marshal. Beyond his military service, Arthur also played a key constitutional role abroad. From 1911 to 1916, he served as Governor General of Canada, becoming the only British prince ever to hold the post. After returning to Britain, he continued to undertake royal and military responsibilities well into the early years of the Second World War.

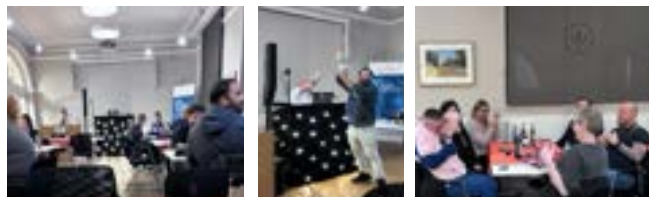
Prince Arthur remained the last surviving son of Queen Victoria until his death in 1942. His connection to Aldershot, marked by the laying of the foundation stone in 1894, remains a notable chapter in the town's rich military heritage.

The building has now been redeveloped by Weston Homes as The Head Quarters, featuring 34 luxury apartments and houses.

My husband and I often sit by our kitchen window while we have breakfast or prepare meals, looking out onto the street. One of our small daily pleasures is spotting local dog walkers giving their faithful companions their morning or evening fresh air.

But something curious has caught my attention... Many people don't just have a dog — they have two dogs. And not just any two dogs. Often, they're the same dogs. Same breed. Sometimes even the same colour. Sometimes so alike that I wonder if one of them is simply moving very quickly.

Once you notice it, you see it everywhere: two spaniels, two Shiba Inus, two Siberian huskies, two Italian greyhounds... the list goes on. Matching fluffy little pairs trotting proudly down the pavement.

It's made me think about something deeper. From the very beginning, the Bible says that it's not good for us to be alone. With the arrival of spring, we've built both the decking and the shed.

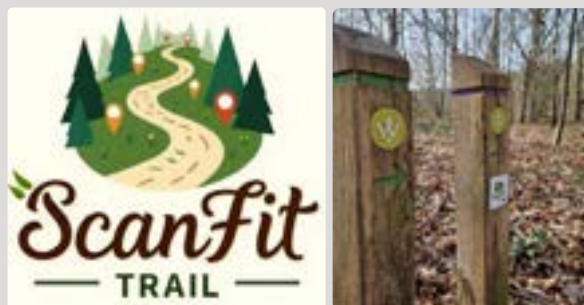
Also, we have few members in now. We are working on to make a group of dedicated members who will work in the garden. If you would like to join us, please email us at belizme4@gmail.com

ScanFit Trail - A Community Focussed, Free Outdoor Fitness Initiative On YOUR Doorstep



A new outdoor fitness initiative is helping residents stay active while enjoying their local green spaces, as ScanFit Trail Ltd continues to expand with several sites now open to the public.

Founded by Carl Sharples and Roger Harnden, the company has introduced interactive fitness trails designed to make exercise simple, enjoyable and accessible for all ages and abilities. Trails are currently available at Wellesley Woodlands near the Wellington Statue, Aldershot Park, and Southwood Country Park, with more locations planned.

Each trail features a series of QR codes placed along popular walking routes. Visitors can scan the codes using their smartphone to access guided exercises and short workouts suitable for different fitness levels. The concept encourages people to combine outdoor walking with easy exercise stations that support both physical and mental wellbeing.

Importantly, the trails are completely free to use. There is no membership, no app to download and no charge—users simply scan and get started.

Co-founder Carl Sharples said they wanted to create something that made fitness accessible to everyone and added value to community parks. Fellow co-founder Roger Harnden highlighted the positive response from residents, saying it has been encouraging to see people of all ages using the trails while enjoying the outdoors.

The project has been made possible thanks to support from local organisations and partners

who share the goal of promoting healthier, more active communities. Special thanks go to Wellesley Woodlands, The Conservation Volunteers, The Land Trust and Rushmoor Borough Council for helping bring the initiative to life.

With multiple sites now open across Rushmoor Borough, ScanFit Trail Ltd hopes to continue expanding and inspiring more people to get active in their local parks.



Rushmoor Community in Bloom is back for 2026

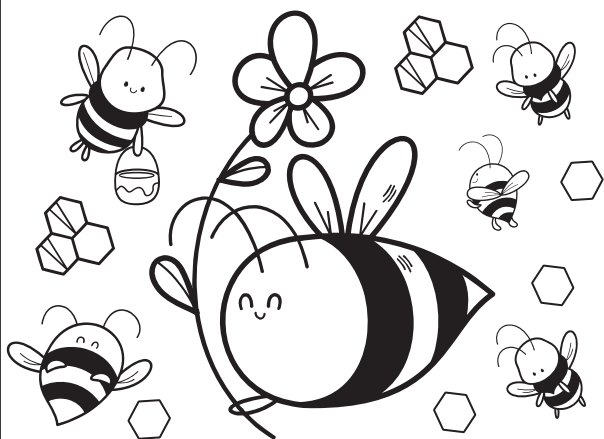

Blackwater Valley

Spring has officially sprung with everything now coming alive! We move from the cold wet winter to warmer time where we move away from our winter scrub cutting and tree felling due to bird nesting season between March and September. We look towards our summer program of path creation, repair and maintenance and getting all the benches and picnic tables some TLC.

As always we value our volunteers who do so much at Wellesley and the wider Blackwater valley portfolio of sites. We have had them using their expert skills by pruning all the rhododendron around the statue to maintain the sight of the statue, and also promoting it to grow sideways to blanket the ground to stop the brambles taking over. They have also been around the Puckridge Dog Barracks pruning all the regrowth from the invasive Laurel removal from last year and fingers cross we can keep on top of it so it!

We held our first Volunteer task on Sunday 1st March and it was a massive success with 7 people helping to clear some of the regrowth of laurel next to the statue. Keep an eye out for posters for the next volunteer tasks!

Severn Trent Connect

At Severn Trent Connect, we know that at different points in life, many of us may need a little extra help. Whether due to age, health needs, disability, a change in circumstances, or anything that makes day to day tasks more challenging, we want to ensure every resident receives the support they need. That's why we work closely with South East Water, who act as our customer services and billing partner. They also manage the Priority Services Register (PSR) – a free and confidential service designed for anyone who may need additional support with their water and wastewater services.

What is the Priority Services Register?

The PSR is a service for residents who:

- Have a physical or mental health condition
- Have mobility or communication needs
- Are elderly and living alone
- Have young children at home
- Face financial difficulties
- Have any circumstance that means they may need extra help

There's no need to provide detailed evidence – if you feel you would benefit, you can simply register.

What support is available?

Residents registered on the PSR can receive:

- Priority support during incidents such as sewer issues or flooding
- Accessible communication, including large print, braille, audio, or translated materials
- A nominated person who can receive your correspondence or speak on your behalf
- Financial support, including social tariffs or WaterSure for eligible households
- Proactive check ins during service issues to ensure you are safe and supported

All services are completely free of charge.

Small Seasonal Shifts With Big Impact

As spring begins, it's the perfect time to reset habits and lighten your impact. Here are a few easy actions for a greener month.

Tip 1:



A Spring Clean... For Your Energy Use
April's unpredictable weather is a great prompt for a quick "energy audit" - winter often leaves us with unchanged heating settings and forgotten standby devices, making this a natural time to rethink them.

Try a 10-minute check of:

- Heating timers still set for December conditions.
- Devices left on standby over winter (TVs, consoles, smart speakers, spare monitors).
- Chargers still plugged in after the darker months.
- Radiators partially blocked by winter furniture arrangements.

Longer days mean electronics take a bigger slice of your energy use. Switching off standby can save around £60 a year and noticeably reduce carbon.

Tip 2:



Make the Most of the Longer Evenings
From mid-March, sunset creeps past 6pm - the moment many people feel their daily routine shift. This is a perfect time to build one small, lower-carbon habit:

- Swap one short drive or bus journey for a walk.
- End a workday with a 20-minute daylight stroll instead of switching on devices.
- Try "active errands" — walking to pick up milk, posting a parcel, or visiting the park.

Tiny changes, but the lighter evenings make them easier to stick to.

Tip 3: Grow Something You'll Actually Use



Spring is an ideal time to plant a variety of herbs and vegetables, including basil, lettuce, spinach, and tomatoes, which thrive in the warmer weather.

Best Herbs:

- Basil
- Chives
- Coriander
- Dill
- Mint

Best Vegetables:

- Lettuce
- Spinach
- Tomatoes
- Cucumbers
- Carrots

Growing one or two herbs you genuinely use often reduces packaging, transport emissions and food waste.
